

REPORTER OF THE WEEK (Tuesday, March 12, 2001)

President Serge Hadjolian opened Ireland Day with the melodious sounds of the talented children of the Ambassadors of Peace Orchestra for the day, when you can be born Irish, or Irish just for the day. The Irish National Anthem was played by the children. Scarlett Pildes then led the singing of the Star Spangled Banner. Joseph Sullivan gave the invocation. Giorgic Balestrieri introduced the visiting Rotarians, two from the states and three from abroad. Tim O'Brien, who had masterfully organized the day introduced our speaker, Philomena Murnaghan, the Deputy Permanent Representative of Ireland at the United Nations. Ms. Murnaghan traced the development of the world body from 1945 when there were only 51 members to the present membership of 189. She reminded us that lack of human and financial resources remain a critical problem for an organization caught up in increasing numbers of internal, tribal and ethnic conflicts in post-Cold War diplomacy. She told us that Ireland has been elected one of ten non-permanent members of the Security Council and is the fourth largest contributor of troops to the SC and the EU. The raffle was fun and the cockles of our hearts were indeed touched when Sylvan Barnet won the mink earmuffs. Is that the luck of the Irish or what?
