

REPORTER OF THE WEEK AUSTRIA DAY - Tuesday, September 25, 2001

President Helen Reisler began Austria Day by introducing Scarlett Pildes, who led the Club in the singing of The Star-Spangled Banner, followed by the Austrian National Anthem on tape. Sylvan Barnet gave a heartfelt invocation. Later in the program, Allison Alessi introduced the visiting Rotarians, six from abroad and five from the States.

Hans Belcsak began the Austria Day program by reminding us of the long tradition of friendship between Austria and the United States. November 26 has officially been named Austrian-American Day. He read a letter from the President of Austria to the Austrian American Consul and to Rotary, expressing his sorrow for the events of September 11, and affirming Austria's solidarity with the U.S. in the fight against terrorism.

The speaker of the day was Dr. Christoph Thun-Hohenstein, Director of the Austrian Cultural Forum in New York, who spoke about an Austrian's cultural vision for the 21st century. To find new ways to marry cultural achievement with technology. Art is about creativity and it's cultural consequences. He discussed the relationship of art and human creation, and the role of art in human suffering. The challenge is to extract what is valuable from the human experience.

He mentioned the forum's new building, at 11 East 52nd Street, which exhibits the balance between technology and human experience. The center has new ways of presenting art, music, as well as visual art. The new center will open in April 2002.

GIFT OF LIFE UPDATE

On Austria Day, Chairperson of the day Hans Belcsak presented me with a round-trip airline ticket from Austria to New York to be used for a Gift of Life child. In my remarks, I mentioned how this gesture could make the difference in saving the life of one child that might otherwise not be able to come to the USA for the type of lifesaving surgery offered by the Gift of Life. I also mentioned that when we had Firemen's Recognition Day back in April, I asked the speaker how firemen go about rescuing someone from a burning building, and he said "one person at a time." That speaker was First Deputy Commissioner Bill Feehan, who died at the World Trade Center doing just that, trying to rescue one person at a time. Indeed that is what the Gift Of Life is all about – to save "one child at a time" so that they can live a full life.

Right now, the 1,000-mile run/walk is 75 percent done. The good people who have been running and walking on behalf of the Gift of Life have covered 750 miles and are now in central Pennsylvania. They will soon be coming through New Jersey and on SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 30, will be entering New York City. I greatly admire the people doing this 1,000-mile journey to raise money and awareness about the Gift of Life. Our group plans to walk with them as they go up First Avenue past the UN. Please join us for this event.

If you cannot join us on Sunday, make a contribution to "Gift of Life, Inc." and say it's in support of the walk/run. If you have the resources, one person or organization can pay the entire costs of saving one child's life by contributing \$5,000 through the Save a Child Program.
